ADMINISTRATOR & BOARD OF HEALTH PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We are pleased to present this report which summarizes those services provided during the past year, as well as a summary of the occurrence of specific reportable communicable diseases. In the past year, the Health Department has continued our efforts to prevent the spread of disease, ensure the safety of food and water, promote the health of children and adults, and protect the natural environment.

Our staff members continue to assess the needs of the community and work in collaboration with other local partners. Tazewell, Peoria and Woodford County Health Departments were the first accepted multi-county Local Health Assessment Partnership approved by the Illinois Department of Public Health. Work has been progressing for our local area under this collaborative's name Partnership for a Healthy Community. Please check their progress at www.healthyhoi.org

Tazewell County Health Department staff have been working very hard on all our identified health priorities but we would like to give special recognition to staff's work in our Mental Health First Aid and Diabetes Prevention Program. In both cases, employees have stepped forward and are working in areas that are not in their day to day job description to assist with health needs in the community.

Mental Health First Aid teaches a 5-step action plan to offer initial help to people with the signs and symptoms of a mental illness or in a crisis, and connect them with the appropriate care. Since being certified, TCHD facilitators have trained 36 citizens in Mental Health First Aid and 52 have been trained in the Mental Health First Aid for Youth curriculum.

As part of our agency's commitment to promoting healthy eating and active living, two staff were trained in the Diabetes Prevention Program. These two are certified leaders who can work with citizens who are prediabetic to learn ways to improve their health. Our staff in all areas are exceptional and have a passion for providing ways for our community to advance in their personal wellness.

The Board of Health, Tazewell County Health Department and its employees are proud to be able to serve you.



MARGARET BURT PUBLIC HEALTH PARTNERSHIP AWARD

Margaret Burt was a resident of Washington, Illinois. She was an original member of the Tazewell County Board of Health starting in December 1970, and became President in 1973. She was extremely active, not only in Tazewell County regarding public health, but throughout the state.

In 1971, she joined the Illinois Association of Boards of Health and the Illinois Public Health Association. She assisted both organizations in many capacities including serving on the Executive Council. She was very active in lobbying for public health issues and with the Illinois Department of Public Health Task Force looking into qualifications for public health employees.

Margaret received several awards for her dedication to ensure the public's health. She was a champion of public health. Margaret Burt passed away in February 2002. The Public Health Partnership Award was renamed in her honor.

- John Dossey, Chief of Pekin Police Department. Chief Dossey has been instrumental in implementing initiatives including Heroin Task Force, Bridges out of Poverty, increasing collaborations in the community to further public health's mission.

- Bill Heisel, Edison Junior High Principal. Bill has continually supported the TCHD Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program to ensure that students receive information necessary to make positive life choices.
- Nancy Hinnen, Heart of Illinois United Way/SAL Child Care Connection. Nancy has been a strong collaborative partner to empower children and their families through her work with education and social emotional wellness.
- Judy Oakford, Volunteer. Judy has been a constant supporter of TCHD programs for over 20 years. She began with Project Success and continues to be involved with Tazewell Teen Initiative today.

TAZEWELL PUBLIC HEALTH FOUNDATION

Tazewell Public Health Foundation provides grant funding through an application process to a requesting agency that serves Tazewell County residents and addresses one of the Tazewell County 4 Health Priorities:

The Tazewell Public Health Foundation grant recipients for 2017 were honored at the Board of Health Reception and received their grant funds.

- Tazewell County AOK was able to purchase the license to show the Raising of America program throughout the county. 43 providers were present at the first showing and additional events are planned.
- John L. Hensey School supported the “Will of the Wildcat” program to share character building behaviors with 750 students in the school.









Educational Attainment among 25 yrs or older population



IT TAKES A VILLAGE - CAR SEAT INSTALL

A client came for a WIC appointment by cab. When she was ready to leave, a nurse case manager noticed that the baby was not in a car seat. TCHD Child Passenger Safety Technicians (CPS) worked to fit baby into one of our seats from our inventory. Due to the baby being so small, she was unable to be sent home safely and staff were not willing to let her leave unrestrained. Her mother-in-law picked her and baby up, while 2 CPS Technicians went to Walmart and purchased an appropriate seat through our IDOT Grant. These staff then went to the house, installed the seat and provided parent education. Thanks to all the Birth to Five staff involved to make sure this little one is safe!



BUSINESS OPERATIONS

DEPOSIT QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

A Mini-Kaizen was initiated in Business Operations Division in January 2016 on Deposit procedure. Our revenue consists of checks that come in mail and fees collected on site. It took an average of 30 days to be posted on the TCHD's accounting system after receipted. It affected our ability to get timely revenue information and our ability to budget, project and close out grants. Our goal was to reduce the mean number of days it took to post income to the accounting system by 20%. Using the Ranking Matrix, Fishbone Diagram and Action Steps Chart, a new process went into effect on May 1, 2016. After implementing the new process, the mean number of days decreased from 30 to 5 days, a total reduction of 83%. To evaluate the effectiveness of the process's change, a control chart and specified an upper control limit (UCL) measure were used.



COLORECTAL SCREENING

The Clinic has expanded its preventive healthcare service line to offer colorectal cancer screening kits, known as FIT kits. The service is available to clients between the ages of 50 to 75, who meet certain criteria. The FIT kit initiative is part of a statewide pilot project started by Rhonda Andrews, Fayette County Health Department Administrator, who lost her husband to colon cancer in 2015. Over 40 local health departments in Illinois have joined the project to date.

Every day, 17 people in Illinois are diagnosed with colorectal cancer (CRC). In Illinois, CRC is the third most commonly diagnosed cancer, and the second leading cancer-related cause of death. When diagnosed at an early stage, survival rates are significant. Screening options such as colonoscopies and home testing have been identified as successful strategies for early detection. The American Cancer Society has established a national goal to increase the proportion of adults ages 50+ who receive a colorectal screening to 80% by 2018. The TCHD Clinic is excited to participate in the FIT initiative and the ultimate goal of 80% screening rates.

ILLINOIS WISEWOMAN

The Illinois WiseWoman Program (IWP) is funded by the Illinois Department of Public Health and provides women screenings for heart disease, including blood pressure, glucose and cholesterol. Women may join IWP if they:

- Currently are enrolled in or eligible for the Illinois Breast and Cervical Program
- Living within the counties currently being served (Tazewell, Peoria, Marshall and Woodford)
- Under or uninsured
- 40-64 years of old
- Living at or below 250 percent of federal poverty level

Eligible women will have a fasting lipid panel and glucose to determine current lab values. Also, they will receive risk reduction counseling by reviewing these values with their provider during a combined office visit for their breast and cervical screenings.

Participants can receive health coaching covering: nutrition and healthy eating, physical activity, finding a support system, addressing stress issues, chronic disease self-management, and medication adherence. IWP participants may be referred to lifestyle programs such as weight watchers and/or WISEWORDS (texting program - participants receive 1 text message every day for 18 weeks; messages include healthy eating and physical activity tips), 6-month gym membership at no cost to the participant, referral to the Illinois Quitline for smoking cessation and pharmaceutical assistance.

FOOD INSPECTION CHANGES

In 2017, Environmental Health began training food facilities on the 2013 FDA Food Code and the new food inspection process. By the end of 2017, 164 of the 762 Tazewell County food facilities attended the FDA Risk Based training. The FDA risk based inspection approach is needed to evaluate and plan for food safety concerns.

The inspection process strongly encourages the person in charge (PIC) to walk with the inspector throughout the inspection. Inspectors conduct a 2-3 minute walkthrough to determine what dynamic processes are occurring. Dynamic processes are those that may change quickly. After all dynamic processes are evaluated, the inspector moves onto the static processes. These are processes such as cold/ hot holding or dry food storage.

During the inspection, the inspector discusses the demonstration of knowledge by the person in charge and other employees. With this new inspection process, some operators may feel anxiety or frustration, but inspections are learning opportunities that are meant to reduce the spread of food borne illnesses and ensure the safety of customers.

With the 2013 FDA food code, the inspection process and the new inspection form comes a new enforcement procedure that eliminates scoring and focuses on correction of the food borne illness risk factors and good retail practices. The Tazewell County Board of Health adopted new enforcement procedures based on the FDA food code in December 2017.
